The Anatomy of an Elephant

PARTS OF THE ELEPHANT'S ANATOMY THAT HELP HER SURVIVE THE SAVANNA

The elephant's tusks are elongated incisor teeth. Sharp tusks are used for carrying heavy objects for diggling, rippling hark of trees, loraging, carrying heavy objects and for resting a wary, heavy trunk on.

The brain makes the elephant an intelligent creature.

Elephants have large ears which they flag to keep themselves coel. Ears are a prefective leature to ward off potential threats.

An elephant is canable of hearing sound waves well below the human learing limitation. This function is used for long range communication, between the olephants. Elephant ears are extremely sensitive and studies have proof that elephants can communicate over great distances with each other.

Tail to whisk away flies or other insects.

The strong, long trunk performs many tasks. With 40,000 muscles the trunk is both strong and agile. It can push over heavy troes and pick up the smallest fivig. An elephand uses its trunk to pick up and throw objects, rub an liche wer or art. Ill list the runk with water and then pours it into its mouth to drink. The trunk sextremely lieschie and can be used with the linest touch. At the lirst sign of danger, an elophant raises its trunk to smell the air and detect the smell of what is threatoning.

The sole of an elephant's foot is made of a tough, fatty connective issue which allows the elephant to move about silently. The sole of the foot is also ridged which gives the elephant stability when walking over a different termins. Their large, deep loot prints create holes in which water can be cellected to provide water beles for small animals to first.

Sharpen your senses



Go outside during an early sunny summer morning and sit for 15 minutes. Take a pencil and notebook. You can write or ask an adult to write down for you. Record what you hear, see, smell, and feel.
